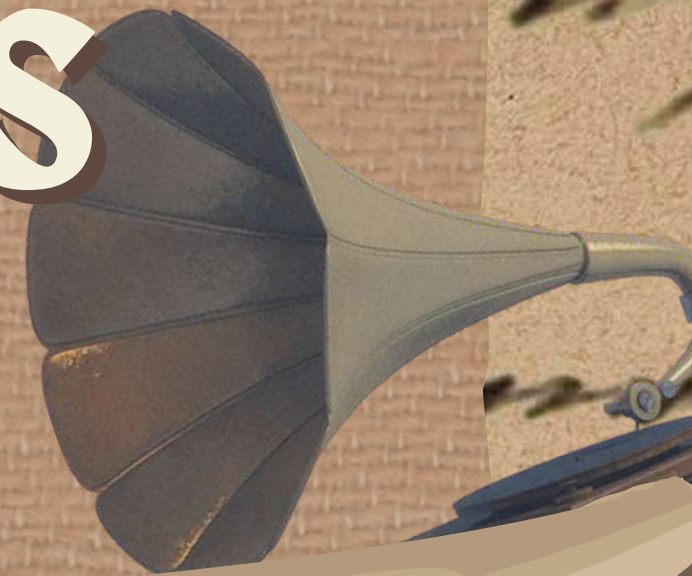

## Norse myth

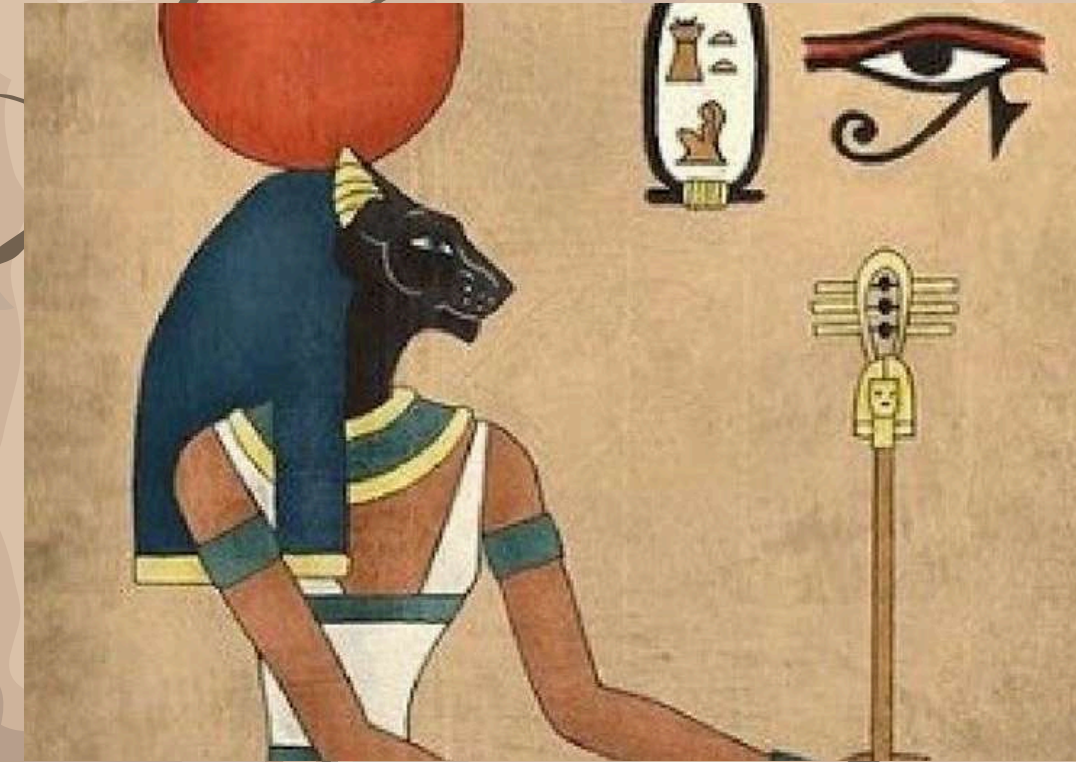

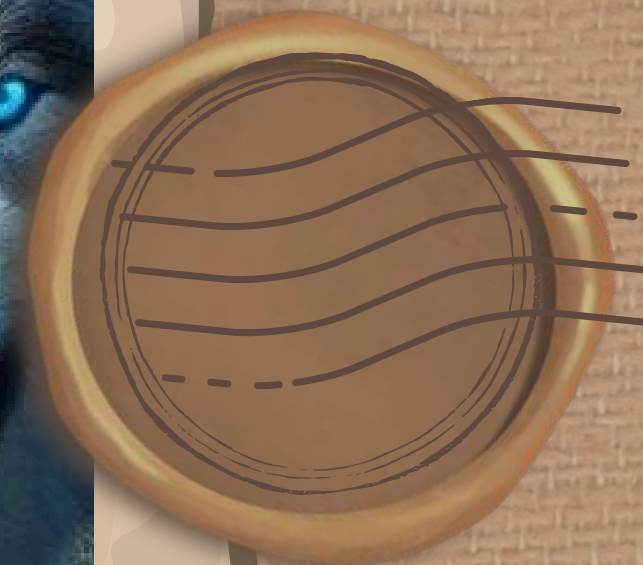

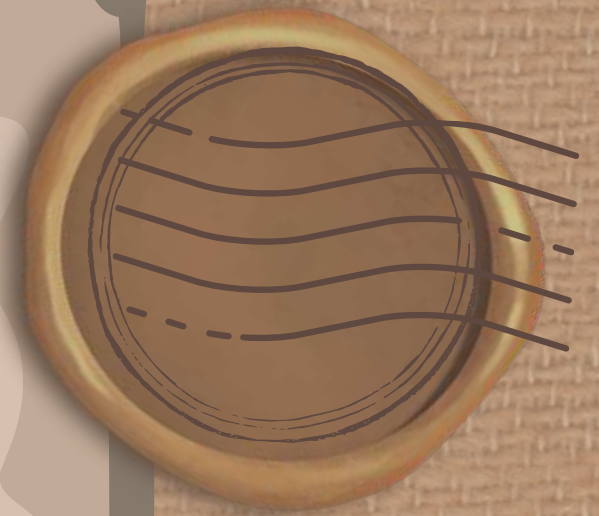
